Votes by your state legislators on key small business issues are listed here. Although this Voting Record does not reflect all elements considered by a lawmaker when voting, nor does it represent a complete profile of a legislator, it can be a guide in evaluating your legislators' attitudes toward small business. Please thank those legislators who supported small business.

## BOTH CHAMBERS

- 1. Organized Retail Crime (2023 – AB 50):** This legislation provides the Nevada Attorney General with additional capacities to investigate and prosecute organized retail crime and appropriates additional funding to do so. **A “YES” vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed the Senate 20-1. Passed the Assembly 42-0. Signed by the governor.
- 2. Office of Small Business Advocacy (2023 – SB 24):** This legislation continues operation of the Nevada Office of Small Business Advocacy to July 1, 2025, and appropriates funds to hire additional staff to assist and support small business owners. **A “YES” vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed the Senate 20-0. Passed the Assembly 42-0. Signed by the governor.
- 3. Product Ban (2023 – SB 76):** This legislation would have banned manufacturers and Nevada retailers from selling many common products containing certain chemical compositions, imposes unrealistic compliance standards, onerous fines, and criminal penalties. **A “NO” vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed the Senate 16-4. Passed the Assembly 37-4. Vetoed by the governor.
- 4. Personal Property Tax Simplification (2023 – SB 233):** This legislation would have provided equipment rental companies with a more fair and efficient tax structure by replacing the burdensome and inefficient personal property tax with a flat assessment on lease contracts. **A “YES” vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed the Senate 19-2. Failed in the Assembly 27-15.
- 5. Government Regulation Notification Requirements (2023 – SB 261):** This legislation strengthens notification and workshop requirements for local governments when promulgating regulations that will have an impact on small businesses, including timely notification to trade groups. **A “YES” vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed the Senate 20-1. Passed the Assembly 42-0. Signed by the governor.
- 6. Employee Retirement Plans (2023 – SB 305):** This legislation creates a new mandatory state-operated retirement plan for private sector employees. **A “NO” vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed the Senate 15-5. Passed the Assembly 35-7. Signed by the governor.

- 7. Government Efficiency and Fiscal Responsibility (2023 – SB 431):** This bill reorganizes Nevada state government by consolidating oversight of the various licensing boards and increases rainy day fund amounts amongst other things. **A “YES” vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed the Senate 21-0. Passed the Assembly 42-0. Signed by the governor.

## SENATE ONLY

- 8. Workplace Temperature and Air Quality Regulations (2023 – SB 427):** This bill would have imposed numerous and vaguely defined one-size-fits-all workplace mandates related to heat, temperature, and air quality while also creating new fines and penalties for compliance errors. **A “NO” vote supports the NFIB position.** Passed the Senate 13-8.
